



## At the Heart of Easter



Easter Sunday is *the* day of the year for Christians. What happened on Easter provides the key that unlocks the meaning of everything else. So what is the key that gets us to the very heart of Easter?

Easter is the celebration of God's victory in a knock-down, drag-out, life-or-death, bloody battle between good and evil, life and death. It is the event that turned the tide in a war that had embroiled the world since the beginning of time.

As we have just observed the 150th anniversary of the beginning of the Civil War, it is appropriate that we remember what happened on July 4, 1863. The Confederacy seemed on the verge of winning the war, having made its greatest advance into Union territory. But on that day, in Gettysburg, PA, the Union Army under General George Meade turned back the Confederate Army led by General Robert E. Lee. From then on, the South was in retreat.

Unknown to anyone in Gettysburg, at the time, on the very same day, a thousand miles away, the city of Vicksburg, Mississippi, was surrendering to Union General Ulysses S. Grant after a long and gruesome siege. The defeat at Gettysburg halted the Confederate advance; the fall of Vicksburg cut the Confederate supply line. That was it. The war was over. No one knew it, of course,

and more months of fighting were still to come. But the South was defeated on July 4, 1863.

Satan was defeated on a Sunday morning 2,000 years ago. God had fought tooth-and-nail, to the death, for us, and God won. Few people knew it at the time, and many still don't know it.

Skirmishes are still being fought. Satan still has some life in him; he still conducts rear-guard campaigns that inflict pain and make it sometimes seem he has the upper hand. But he doesn't, and *he never will*.

Christ defeated Satan on that Sunday morning long ago. The question is not who the victor is. That is known. The question is: Whose side are you on?

## The Church at All Times and All Places

Carol and I have been fortunate to travel some and we love to visit other Episcopal churches when we're away from St. Paul's. We almost always feel at home, worshipping with the familiar liturgy and typically warm welcome by the local congregation, but enjoying local differences, too. This won't quite cover "the Church at all times and all places," but I'm going to briefly describe three of our experiences in Episcopal churches in the United States. Perhaps in another article I'll tell about our visits to Anglican churches in England, Northern Ireland and Malta.

**'Nude baby baptism church.'** A few years ago, our extended family went to Florida to celebrate my uncle's 80th birthday. We ended up going to Calvary Episcopal Church in Indian Rocks Beach on Sunday. As always we felt very comfortable in the service, and were delighted to find there was a baptism scheduled that Sunday. However, our jaws dropped when time came for the baptism and the infant was suddenly slipped out of his baptismal gown and plopped down into the font filled with consecrated water! The differences didn't end there -- after the baptism, the consecrated water was recovered and used to sprinkle the congregation during a long procession around the nave! Calvary Episcopal Church in Indian Rocks Beach will forever for us be the "nude baby baptism church."

**New beginnings.** When our daughters were growing up we often vacationed in Florida on Sanibel Island. Normally our week on the island included a Sunday and we enjoyed attending St. Michael and all Angels, the Episcopal parish on Sanibel Island. We lowered the average age of the congregation somewhat, but we always felt welcome. One of our interesting experiences there

was attending on the last Sunday before they started an extensive enlargement of their nave. Everyone present, including us, helped carry hymnals and prayer books to the parish hall where they planned to worship while the remodeling was being done; the closing hymn was sung in the parish hall. When we came back the next year, we got to see the beautiful job they had done remodeling.



**Unplanned adventures in Hawaii.** One of our recent experiences took place last October. We were on a two-week cruise to Hawaii with Carol's parents and weren't scheduled to be in port at a time we could attend church. However, on Saturday while docked in Honolulu, Carol's mother Jean fell in their stateroom and badly broke her upper femur. We all disembarked the cruise and Jean had surgery the next morning at Queens Medical Center to in-

stall some significant metal in her leg.

It turned out that the Cathedral Church of St. Andrew was only a couple of blocks from Queens and I went to the 10:00 a.m. Eucharist when we knew Jean was out of surgery and in the recovery room. It was a great place to pray for Jean's recovery and lots of other things. We were still in Honolulu the following Sunday – we all flew to the mainland that evening and the next morning – and Carol and I went together to St. Andrew's.

We both were comforted by the familiar liturgy, and enjoyed the local differences. One of their unique local customs was a call to worship by blowing on a conch shell. The congregation also concluded the prayers of the people by singing (in Hawaiian) a prayer by Queen Liliuokalani, a song of haunting beauty.

Carol and I love worshiping at St. Paul's. However, we also enjoy worshiping with God's people in places where we are fortunate enough to visit.

## **Kathleen Clark, Mission To China**

The Episcopal Church website poses the questions: "Ready for an experience that will transform your life? Want to be a part of what God is doing in the world? Want to help, work, laugh, love, cry, and worship with God's people?"

If your answers are "yes," they say you are ready to work with Young Adult Service Corps (YASC) in a one-year assignment. Kathleen Clark of St. Paul's Church Murfreesboro was one who answered in the affirmative.

"I have been discerning a call to serve God and his Church for several years," Kathleen says. "I was able to answer that call by accepting a position with the YASC, a branch of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the U.S. Episcopal Church. God willing, I will depart in July for a year long position working with migrant women in Hong Kong."

She will be working in the Mission for Migrant Workers (MFMW), a migrant-serving institution established in Hong Kong in 1981. It is an ecumenical institution assisting migrant workers who are in distress and supporting efforts for the recognition and respect of the rights and well-being of migrant workers. "First and foremost," she continues, "I ask for prayers and encouragement as God guides me according to His will. The next year will undoubtedly be challenging and overwhelming in many ways, and your prayers and support will help me through. Secondly, I am asking for financial support. The church cannot engage in mis-

sionary work without resources, and as part of my preparation for this work, I need to raise \$10,000 - approximately half of the total cost of supporting an overseas missionary."

Not everyone is called or is able to become a missionary, but through spiritual and financial support anyone can participate in the healing work to which God calls us. There are different levels of participation by donation: 1 Day = \$28; 2 Days = \$52; 1 Week = \$192. If you are interested in donating, contact Kathleen via email, KathleenTN@gmail.com.

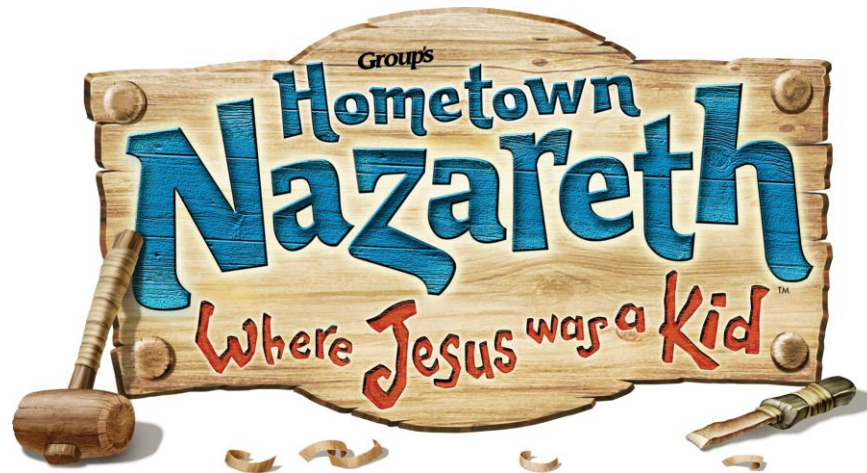
