





Looking Back and Living Forward



*Time present and time
past
Are both perhaps present
in time future,
And time future contained
in time past...*

These are the opening words of the first quartet of T.S. Eliot's classic, "The Four Quartets."

And so he launches his exploration of what it means for us to live in a changing, imperfect world as beings who can occasionally catch glimpses of grace, the sacred, invisible reality that is behind, and at the heart of, all things. We live in the present, but unlike other animals, we are also conscious of the past and future.

The season of change that is upon us is one of those intersections of time past and time future. St. Paul's has just completed a long season of discernment. I know that the knowledge gained and the lessons learned will be used for God's glory. I also know that in the coming years, in the rhythm of our lives together, in the good times and in the bad, in our shared joys and sorrows, we will indeed catch more than our fair share of glimpses of grace. That is because you are an extraordinary parish. For allowing us to be a part of you I will be forever grateful.

Ecclesiastes 3 offers a litany of the actions of our everyday life and their opposites: "To everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under heaven..."

I find myself doing a lot of self-reflection during these days that symbolically bridge the past, present, and future. And what I

have found is that I am glad for cycles of beginnings and endings. I am glad for the renewed strength that comes from these seasons of change, between what has been and what is yet to be. This is a time that offers a chance for self-assessment, for soul searching, an opportunity for those old practices of confession and forgiveness. It is a time for tying up the loose ends, cleaning house (figuratively and literally!), and starting anew.

As I look back, I try to see what I have learned while also facing the rising sun of a new season. This is a time where I would be wise to linger for a moment, to step outside of time, pausing to take stock of the spiritual work I need to attend to. In the words of Ecclesiastes, this can be a season in my own soul of casting away and gathering up, of uprooting and planting, of dying and of giving birth.

The last stanzas of T.S. Eliot's "The Four Quartets," say it best:

*What we call the beginning is often the end
And to make an end is to make a beginning.
The end is where we start from...
And all shall be well and
All manner of thing shall be well....*

My prayer is that this time of endings and beginnings will be a time of explorations of the heart and journeys of the soul for each one of us. May we all remember the One who is the source of life and all love as we move into the future. And may you stand firm in the knowledge that ...all shall be well and all manner of thing shall be well....

Advent: Then, Now, and To Come

Advent serves as a dual reminder of the original waiting that was done by the Hebrews for the birth of the Messiah as well as the waiting that Christians today endure as we await the second coming of Christ.

Whenever someone mentions the second coming, my mind immediately brings forth a favored poem by W.B. Yeats—aptly titled, *The Second Coming*. The poem was written to reflect what was happening with the Russian Revolution—a chaotic time in history for sure:

*Turning and turning in the widening gyre
The falcon cannot hear the falconer;
Things fall apart; the centre cannot hold;
Mere anarchy is loosed upon the world,
The blood-dimmed tide is loosed, and everywhere
The ceremony of innocence is drowned;
The best lack all conviction, while the worst
Are full of passionate intensity.
Surely some revelation is at hand;
Surely the Second Coming is at hand.*

*The Second Coming! Hardly are those words out
When a vast image out of Spiritus Mundi
Troubles my sight: somewhere in sands of the desert
A shape with lion body and the head of a man,
A gaze blank and pitiless as the sun,
Is moving its slow thighs, while all about it
Reel shadows of the indignant desert birds.
The darkness drops again; but now I know
That twenty centuries of stony sleep
Were vexed to nightmare by a rocking cradle,
And what rough beast, its hour come round at last,
Slouches towards Bethlehem to be born?*

You don't have to look hard to see things falling apart these days---the financial world, political bickering, international strife. The picture Yeats paints in his poem might as well have been written about today!

This Advent season the state of the world weighs heavily upon my heart. Now more than ever I pray for the world and look to the future coming of Christ and His heavenly kingdom for hope and peace. The line that most strikes a chord with me: "The best lack all conviction, while the

worst / Are full of passionate intensity." What could be more horrible than a world in which the best people stop caring and the worst proclaim their messages of hatred unfettered?

But it doesn't have to get that way. As a woman in her early-20s, I believe my generation can breathe new life into the world. Even if I stand alone in my convictions for peace and love, I still stand. Call me a hippie, call me a commie, call me whatever you want---but you can't say that I don't care.

Yeats, in case you are unfamiliar, was a pretty weird guy. He was fascinated by mystical Christianity and the occult (and I'll admit to similar fascinations myself). The concluding lines refer to Yeats' belief that history was cyclic, and that his age represented the end of the cycle that began with the rise of Christianity. There's a certain sense of fear and wonder with these lines---what will happen when it's all said and done?

An Advent Reading

I was asked this year to write an Advent reading about a time I was waiting for God. However, when I sat down to brainstorm, I found it difficult to remember such a time.

I thought first of the summer my father died, trying to recapture my nine-year-old spiritual journey. Did I feel I was waiting for God? Did I feel lost, abandoned, angered? It would be much easier to say "yes... where was God then?" but in truth, I felt no separation from Him. God was the Frisbee that allowed my brother and I to bond in the backyard, silently understanding that we'd always be there for one another. He was the numerous casseroles, cakes and loving friends that showed up at our doorstep to nourish us until we could nourish ourselves. God was in every multi-colored marker used by my 2nd grade class to make me sympathy cards. To me, His presence was irrefutable.

But I'm supposed to write about waiting, I thought, and so I kept digging. Perhaps sometime in high school? College? In my more rebellious stages, was I waiting for God to find me again?

When I was confronted with choices far beyond my capacity, responsibilities too weighty for my youth, did I feel as though God had gone missing? Put simply, no.

I knew God was the voice in my head telling me the truth, whether I listened or not. He was the silly games I played at youth group, reminding me that I was still a kid and life wasn't always a struggle. If I turned away, He waited patiently for me. When I pulled Him close, He was more comforting and peaceful than I thought possible.

In truth, I cannot think of a single instance in life where I have had to wait for God. This, to me, is the joy of Advent. It is a symbolic time of preparation for the God that is ever-present. The birth of Christ made it possible for us to never wait for God again. Christ wasn't born. Christ is born. Always. During Advent we celebrate Christ's continual coming into the world, arming ourselves with the hope and gratitude particular to this season. Let us prepare ourselves! Christ is born!

St. Paul's has a new Website

Over a year ago the Vestry commissioned a communications committee to develop a new website. The committee focused on three target groups in designing the new website. First, the website would be informative and inviting to people who have little or no experience in church. Second, it would appeal to new members of our community who are looking for a church. And finally, it would help our current members in the conduct of their church ministries. On November 12, the new website went online.

In this day of increasing use of technology, the Vestry felt it important that St. Paul's have a substantial web presence. The website has two major areas. The first area is unsecured. This section is more specifically directed towards newcomers but has significant information available to our members without logging in. In the "What's Happening" section, you can see the entire church calendar online, including serving schedules for acolytes and lay Eucharistic ministers. If you want to review a bulletin announcement from this week or last, you can find it here as well. You can even find every back issue of the Evangel for the last two years here. If you want to be inspired by some recent offerings from the choir, you can find those in the "Sight and Sound" section. You can take a trip down memory lane in our photo album. Let's say you need to make a document available for members of the church to view or download. You can have it posted by the webmaster in the "downloads" section of "Sight and Sounds" for others to see.

St. Paul's is very interested in keeping our member information up to date. Our website allows you access to the most current information about membership through our online mirrored

database called AccessACS. This section allows you to update your personal information in one place and have it immediately updated with every committee or ministry in which you participate. Say your phone number changes and you are in the choir, on the Altar Guild, and participate in Ladies Night Out. If you update your personal info in AccessACS, each of these committees will automatically have the right information. Say you are a ministry team leader and wish to send an email to your team. Go onto AccessACS and shoot the email to your targeted group. It will always go to the most current email address without your having to change a thing.

Although not available yet, in the future if you wish to access your contribution information for the year, that will be done in AccessACS as well. You can retrieve only your own financial information. No one else will be able to access that, not even the administrator of the website. In the future we will have the ability to allow you to register for events online and even pay for events or pledges online. These features will be for your convenience. If you do not wish your personal information to be accessible to other members, you may restrict any or all access to your personal information. There are no social security numbers in our database, so the only identity information available online is what is already available in the phone book.

We view the Internet as a valuable tool to do God's work. We are constantly seeking ways to make better use of the means at our disposal. We hope that you will visit your new church website often and make use of the valuable tools on AccessACS frequently.

OUTREACH...A Sign of God's Love in the World

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it... These familiar and beautiful words, which we hear on Christmas, remind us that God became one of us, joining us in the darkness of the world to bring light and warmth and life to all. As Christians, we embody that light for the world to see as a sign of God's love for His children. We have been told elsewhere in Scripture that whenever we serve the least of

God's children, it is a sign of Christ's presence among us.

JESUS' BIRTH FROM A-Z

What you need:

- Paper
- Pencils or pens
- Bibles (optional)



What you do:

Instruct players to think of as many Christmas-related words as they can that start with each letter of the alphabet. Start with A and give everyone a minute to brainstorm words for each letter. For example, M words include manger, Mary and miracle. If you get stuck, look at the Nativity accounts in Matthew 1 and 2, and also Luke 2. Players get a point for each word not repeated by others.

What you need:

- Markers, paint or crayons
- Construction paper stars
- Tape
- Blindfold



What you do:

On large paper, draw a picture of a stable. Give each player a star cutout. Put a small + above the manger where the star led the shepherds and wise men to baby Jesus. Like in Pin the Tail on the Donkey, the blindfolded person who puts his or her star closest to the + wins.

Q. *Why do you go to church?*

A. Not an easy question, but a good one. I go because it prepares me for the week ahead.

Q. *How?*

A. I don't exactly know. It gives me a chance to be alone with myself, to do a little self-examination. I need a lot of that. It's a time of contemplation, a time of thinking about one's life; how it is; how it can be made better.

Q. *Any other reason?*

A. Oh, the homily. Does anyone realize what a parade of talent there has been through the St. Paul's pulpit? They are extraordinary.

Q. *And . . . ?*

A. Communion has a special meaning for me.

Q. *Why?*

A. I don't know . . . I mean there's the ancient metaphorical advisories, but beyond that.
