


### SENIOR WARDEN'S WORD

Phillips, Interim Search Chair and Senior Warden.

"With that said, we also are working very hard to surface those candidates and get this process completed, as we have the permanent rector search process about to begin."

Phillips also has been in conversation with Bishop Bauerschmidt about the Interim Search and has received support and encouragement from him.

"The Bishop is actively assisting us in identifying candidates," Phillips said. "We appreciate his input and counsel very much."

One person was interviewed last month and currently is a candidate for the Interim Rector position. The candidate met for an interview with the Interim Search team, followed by an informal meeting with the Vestry.

"We had a good interview with the candidate, and a good meeting with her and the Vestry," said Phillips. "We have received input from Vestry, staff, and individuals in the congregation, and we have documented that input for ongoing discussion and consideration. We appreciate all who have contacted us with their prayers, comments, and thoughts."

Education for Ministry, affectionately known as EFM, is a program of theological education at a distance of the School of Theology of the University of the South. Students sign up one year at a time for this four-year program. It covers the basics of a theological education in the Old and New Testaments, church history, liturgy, and theology. Students meet regularly, usually once a week, in seminars under the guidance of trained mentors. The program grants a certificate at the completion of the four years and 18 Continuing Education Units for each year's work. –from the EFM website

# CHANGE

The more things change, the more they stay the same. The U.S. standard railroad gauge (distance between rails) is four feet, eight-and-one-half inches. Why such an odd number? Because that's the way they built them in England, and American railroads were built by British expatriates. Why did the English adopt that particular gauge? Because the people who built the pre-railroad tramways used that gauge. They in turn were locked into that gauge because the people who built tramways used the same standards and tools they had used for building wagons, which were set on a gauge of four feet, eight-and-one-half inches. "Why were wagons built to that scale? Because with any other size, the wheels did not match the old wheel ruts on the roads.

So who built these old rutted roads? The first long-distance highways in Europe were built by Imperial Rome for the benefit of their legions. The roads have been in use ever since. The ruts were first made by Roman war chariots. Four feet, eight-and-one-half inches was the width a chariot needed to be to accommodate the rear ends of two war horses.

Maybe "that's the way it's always been" isn't always the best reason to keep doing what we've been doing. Change doesn't have to be a frightening thing. When it occurs for the sake of improved health, it's actually a good thing.

Your parish staff is updating the processes we use to support the vital ministries at St. Paul's. We are intentional about the manner in which we make changes and in the ways we do things. Nothing is changed simply for the sake of enacting change. The principle guiding the review of our processes is "evolution, not revolution."

We are perched on the edge of a great wave of growth. Our processes will need to evolve to accommodate the kind of growth projected for us. Therefore, it's important that everyone knows about some of these upcoming changes.

All parents were mailed new information sheets to complete in an effort to maintain current records on the children in our nursery. Thank you all for completing those forms. If you have

not yet completed a form on your child, please drop by the nursery and complete one.

These updates are part of an overall effort to continue to improve our nursery services. Other improvements include: nametags coming, updated CPR training for staff, new playthings for the 3-5 year old room, and many other things.

Another change that we are implementing relates to Parents Night Out. With decreased demand in the summer months, Parents Night Out will be suspended for the months of May through July, and will return in August. To help us defray the costs and to make the nursery available for more events, we will implement a nominal fee for Parents' Night Out. Our nursery staff is working more and more hours, and, in an effort to help offset a portion of the non-worship nursery expenses, we will ask families who are able to participate in a donation program to help subsidize our nursery expenses.

Use of the nursery for worship events will remain absolutely free. Please know that money will never be an obstacle to any family's use of the nursery. Our effort is simply to be good stewards of the resources with which we have been entrusted. We want our nursery to be a shining example of the kind of excellence for which St. Paul's is known in the community and in the diocese. We are also intent on making good use of these blessings to support our life as a community. Please stay tuned for more details.



### Wrapping Up for the Semester with a Splash



# PENTECOST

### (What's behind the name?)

Simply put, Pentecost is the seventh Sunday after Easter, commemorating the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples. Also called Whitsunday., it is celebrated on the Sunday concluding the 50-day period following Easter.

Pentecost is the Greek name for Shavuot, the spring harvest festival of the Israelites, which was going on when the Holy Spirit came.

The disciples were together in Jerusalem after Jesus' Resurrection and return to heaven, fearful because he had left them.

On that morning, however, "there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance."

Because of the festival, crowds of visitors were in



Jerusalem, speaking many languages, but the disciples of Jesus moved among them and spoke to them all, and "every man heard them speak in his own language" about "the

wonderful works of God." Peter then made a powerful speech to the crowds in the city, and many were baptized.

Pentecost is also an important Jewish feast. The Jewish feast of Pentecost, the Feast of Weeks, one of the three pilgrimage festivals, arose as the celebration of the closing of the spring grain harvest, which began formally in Passover 50 days prior; there are numerous references to it in the Bible. From Rabbinic times, the festival commemorates the giving of the law to Moses at Mt. Sinai.

Moreover, Christians consider the day of Pentecost the birthday of the church because, from that moment on, the disciples carried the message of Christ everywhere they went all over the world.

### Why Do We Wear Red?

There is a widespread tradition on Pentecost to wear **RED** to symbolize the tongues of flame and the Holy Spirit.

### (A Day that Changed the World)

Pentecost was a day that, literally, changed the world. Who would have known at the time the impact those events and that day would have on the world. It really was a paradigm shift.

If people would have been asked in 1968 which na-




tion would dominate the world in watchmaking during the 1990s and into the twenty-first century the answer would have been uniform: Switzerland. Why? Because Switzerland had dominated the world of watch making for the previous sixty years.

The Swiss made the best watches in the world and were committed to constant refinement of their expertise. It was the Swiss who came forward with the minute hand and the second hand. They led the world in discovering better ways to manufacture the gears, hearings, and mainsprings of watches. They even led the way in waterproofing techniques and self-winding models. By 1968, the Swiss made 65 percent of all watches sold in the world and laid claim to as much as 90 percent of the profits.

By 1980, however, they had laid off thousands of watchmakers and controlled less than 10 percent of the world market. Their profit domination dropped to less than 20 percent. Between 1979 and 1981, fifty thousand of the

sixty-two thousand Swiss watch-makers lost their jobs. Why? The Swiss had refused to consider a new development—the Quartz movement—ironically, invented by a Swiss. Because it had no main-spring or knob, it was rejected. It was too much of a paradigm shift for them to embrace. Seiko, on the other hand, accepted it and, along with a few



other companies, became the leader in the watch industry.

The lesson of the Swiss watchmakers is profound. A past that was so secure, so profitable, so dominant was destroyed by an unwillingness to consider the future. It was more than not being able to make predictions—it was an inability to re-think how they did business. Past success had blinded them to the importance of seeing the implications of the changing world and to admit that past accomplishment was no guarantee of future success.



He's getting some serious age on him and sometimes his thoughts turn away from the Titans and toward his own, peculiar, simple theology. This spring he motored with a 28-year-old grandson to the Cumberland Plateau. As they tooled through a back-country road, the conversation drifted from athletics to human beings. "See those folks over there?" The old man gestured toward a clutch of cars refilling at a convenience store. "They're Jesus's sheep and maybe the meaning and goals of life are captured in His sacred commandment regarding His sheep." The old man tried to quote—he came close—the scripture cited above.

The young man nodded. "We're all His sheep-black, white, brown." He drew in a deep breath. "Muslims and Al Qaeda."

"All God's children, boy."
