**Book Signing, Sunday, December 12**

**Jesus: One Man, Two Faiths —  
A Dialogue between Christians and Muslims.**

St. Paul's is proud to announce the very recent publication of this important new book by our very own Ron Messier. In his search for channels of dialogue between Christians and Muslims as we move further into the 21st century, Ron finds that Jesus can be such a channel. His book explores a wide range of views within each faith that can be supported by what each faith considers to be its revealed scriptures and traditions. It explores Jesus' birth, his life as perfect servant and as suffering servant, his miracles, the events of Good Friday and Easter, the Ascension to heaven, and Jesus coming again at the end of time. One discovers not only similarities, some of which are quite surprising, but also differences that are more often complementary than contradictory, inviting believers in each faith to reflect on their own images of Jesus and, perhaps, expand those images in light of what the other has to offer.

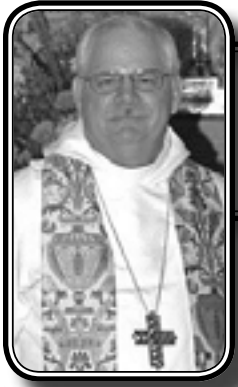

# The Parables of Jesus

**The Rev. Dr. William Brosend of Sewanee Theological Seminary will lead opening class on January 9th.**

"Jesus spoke all these things to the crowd in parables; he did not say anything to them without using a parable."

– *Matthew 13:34*

A respected biblical scholar writes, "Two things are generally known about Jesus of Nazareth that are beyond historical doubt, and they are known around the world by Christians and non-Christians alike. The one is that Jesus was crucified in the first century of the Common Era. The other is that he taught in parables ... For Christian theology and experience, these two items of historical certainty are central. From the standpoint of faith, Jesus as the Christ is the revealer of God and Redeemer of humanity. His parables are the primary medium of revelation, and the Cross is the primary means of redemption."

Jesus' parables are designed to help convey God's truth to everyone. The actual linguistic background of the word parable comes from a compound word in Greek. One word is ballo (which means "to throw") and the other is para (which is a preposition that means "alongside of"). The sense of these two words together is "to throw alongside side of." In his parables Jesus would take an everyday occurrence, something that everyone was familiar with, and then He would throw it alongside a concept about the Kingdom of God. By doing this He could teach everyone about God and His kingdom.

Beginning this January I will be leading a class for the parents of St. Paul's entitled "The Parables of Jesus." The class will meet in the Parish Hall during the Sunday Christian Education Hour and will continue through Easter. Each week we will read and reflect on a new parable from our Lord.

To open our class I have invited the Rev. Dr. William Brosend to be with us on January 9th. As Professor of Preaching at Sewanee Theological Seminary, Fr. Brosend will introduce us to the nature of parables. The insights and presence of Fr. Brosend will be a great blessing and I am sure you will enjoy his time with us.

So ... if you hunger to know more about God and His Kingdom then join us starting in January! Jesus promises that if you are open and ready for what He wants to do through the study of His parables, then He will do what only He can do – He will be your teacher. Through His parables He promises to lead you deeper into the Kingdom of God.

## *Pilgrimage 2011*

Our faith exploration program for adults, called Pilgrimage, will begin Monday evening, January 24, 2011. It will continue for a total of eight consecutive Monday evenings. Each session will start at 6:30 and end at 8:00; child care is provided as needed.

Pilgrimage offers an environment of trust and shared ideas in small group settings. We will provide to each Pilgrim and Sponsor the book "Velvet Elvis" by Rob Bell as the basis for some of our discussions.

Among our topics will be the Christian/Anglican culture, Christian Symbolism, the Old and New Testaments, Grace and Sacramentalism, approaching God with our personality and with our prayers, and how we might respond to God through stewardship and ministry.

Preparation for Confirmation or Reception into the Episcopal Church was the original intent of Pilgrimage. But many have participated, through the years, just for the experience and the opportunity to explore their faith.

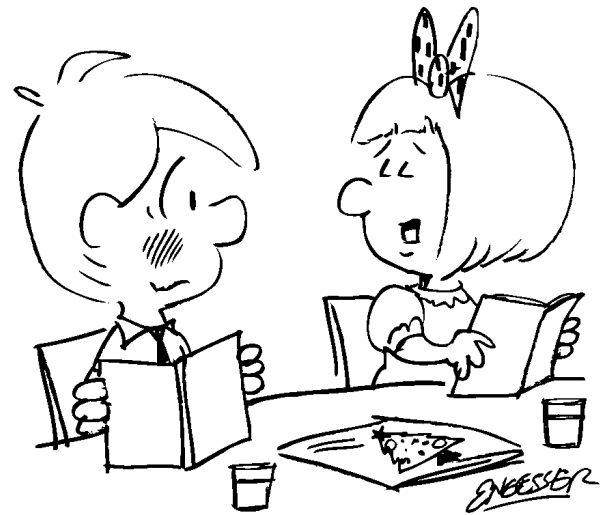

# NATIVITY SCENE POTS

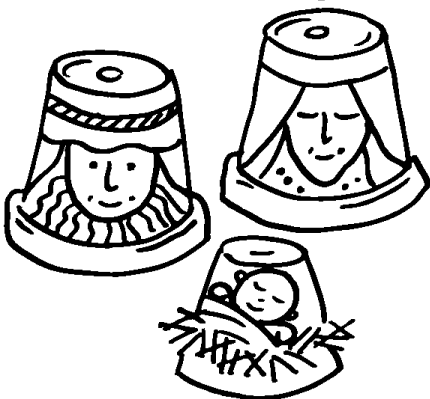
Celebrate the joy of Christmas — and remember Jesus' birth — by making this craft to decorate your home or to give as a gift.

### What you do:

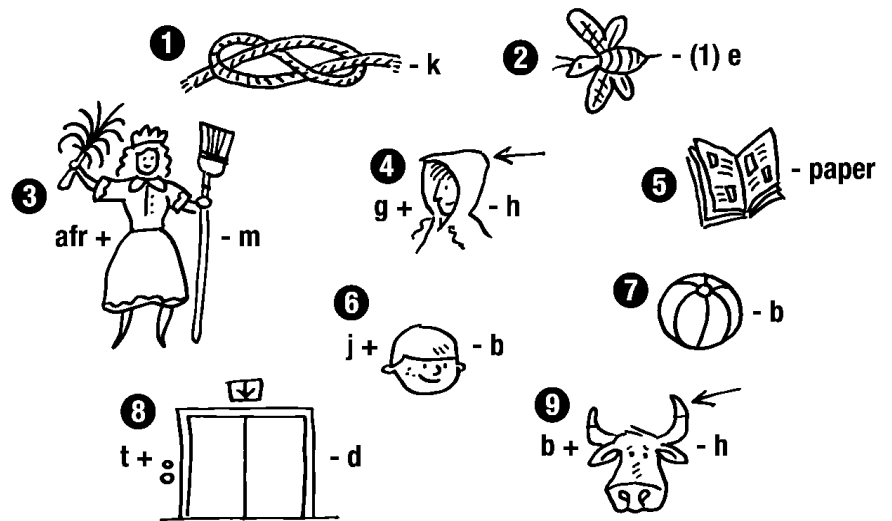
1. Decide which pot will be Joseph, Mary and baby Jesus. Turn each pot upside-down and paint a face on each one.
